Our operations manager, Patrick Crowe, has been busy this year. Along with an army of servant volunteers, they completed and made significant progress on a number of major projects.

The new **Pines** cabin has begun its journey for blessing campers. This was the first summer we were able to put it to use for all sessions.

Lullabye's siding was replaced, and it got repainted and new light fixtures installed.

Dreamland went through an extensive overhaul, including new siding, new electrical and new light fixtures.

The Nature Center also received some long-overdue TLC: it required significant structural framing repair, rebuilding of two walls, new chinking and all new gutters.

Squeeze Inn, Squeeze Out and the Bathhouse are getting new metal roofs (which may be done by this printing!).

Lastly, the **memorial walkway** leading up to the Great Hall and entrance doors is getting a facelift, with a new concrete sidewalk poured and the bricks re-laid on-top of that.

In addition to one-time projects, there are a number of different tasks that take time & effort on a regular basis for Patrick.

The **floor drains** in the bathhouse have consistent draining issues, so time has been spent clearing those and finding a long-term solution.

Camp has many **hiking trails**, which have been cleared/maintained as well as new signs made for them and the devotional sights.

There are always **trees falling**, especially on the boy's side, so there has been a good amount of time spent on cutting and clearing those trees.

Patrick has been working on building and hanging **bat boxes** throughout camp, in an effort to guide the bat population out of our buildings. We have high hopes this will be a big help!

There have been multiple areas around camp that have damage from water erosion, so there have been efforts made toward repairing the driveway to the dining hall, the road through The Hill, and the road down to Lullabye and Dreamland.

After years of faithful use, and lots of repairs, efforts are now being made to sell the old camp Ford truck.

Patrick is also heavily involved in project management for our subcontracted tasks (e.g. re-siding of our cabins). This includes monitoring the budget, coordinating schedules, answering questions, and purchasing materials.

A big "thank you" to Patrick and the Facilities Committee for their tireless, diligent, and expert work on these tasks, and so many more. And, a big supporting-role "thank you" to all the selfless servants who have shown up for various workdays, stuck around after a camp session, or just went to camp on their own terms, to get the jobs done.

Lifeguards needed! We'll pay for your certification!

Our campers love their time in Robinson Creek: tubing down the falls, the Watermelon Wallow, the Wade In, just sitting and soaking. Besides the wonderful people, the beautiful environment, and the solid Christian teaching, Robinson Creek is one of the biggest attractions and staples of camp life.

Interestingly... whenever our campers are in the water, doing those things they enjoy, we are required by state law to have a Red Cross certified lifeguard on duty. Each of our camp sessions have "Lifeguard" as a staff role that needs to be filled... just like the "Nurse", or "Head Bible Teacher", or "Head Cook".

And yet, every summer, WCYC camp session directors struggle to fill their lifeguard positions. Every summer, one or more of the sessions actually have to throttle the amount of time campers can spend in the "creek time," because they can't recruit a lifeguard.

If we cannot enlist a lifeguard, the campers simply don't get to go in the creek. This past summer, we resorted to hiring young people from Black River Falls for several days. And it was not cheap.

For these reasons, the WCYC Board Directors have approved a new program for Summer 2023: The Lifeguard Certification Reimbursement Program.

The details are pretty straightforward:

If you serve as the dedicated lifeguard for (at least) one week of camp...

Then WCYC will reimburse you for the registration fees for the coursework necessary to become a Red Cross Certified Lifeguard.

If this program sounds intriguing to you, please, give it some thought. This is a wonderful way for us to help each other.

You can get certified. That certification is valid for two years. And, you can use it for gainful employment throughout rest of the calendar year. (And lifeguards can make decent money!)

All we ask in return is for you to donate at least one week of your summer to camp.

To be entered into this lifeguard certification reimbursement program, please, reach out to communications@wcyc.org.

Your request must first be approved by the Board of Directors before any funds will be refunded. (We need to ensure applicants can be matched up with a camp session. We don't need, say, four certified lifeguards at Junior Camp.)

Junior Camp

We also invited GTS Life Ministries to the Intermediate Session this year to take campers through the process of discovering their spiritual gifts. It was made evident to campers that they are all wonderfully and purposefully created.

Senior Camp

Senior Camp '22 was what we expected it to be: God was present, helping us to grow in the Lord.

The first week we focused on Old Testament passages that helped us know about God's presence: with Adam and Eve, during the Exodus, in the tabernacle, in the temple, and throughout the Psalms. All this taught us to seek the presence of the Lord.

The second week focused on John. We saw the presence of the Lord in Jesus, who shared the glory of God in human flesh. From the upper room servanthood, to the sacrificial cross and to the victorious empty tomb, Jesus opens the door (tears the curtain) for us to be in His presence all the time, not just in church or at camp.

"Really Nice Guy" Frequently Seen Working on WCYC Camp Grounds




